For this talented young Queensland author success has come quickly – but she's only just getting started in her magical new world

UEENSLAND'S darling of fantasy writing, Lynette Noni, is still coming to terms with being named Supanova Australia's highest-selling author in 2015, just months after releasing her first novel

The 28-year-old from the

Sunshine Coast topped the likes of Peter F. Hamilton and Traci Harding in book sales at the annual pop culture expo, which is unheard of for a debut author.

"It was incredible, it blew my mind and I'm still on a high," she said. "To be named the highest-selling author of a single title was almost crazy. The others were like What is going on here'.

"But they (the other authors) were so encouraging Peter F. Hamilton is the highest-selling sci-fiction writer in Britain and he gave some great advice.

"And so did Justin Woolley and Alan Baxter, they were just full of wisdom and advice."

Noni said she was "like a sponge" for 10 days.

"Anything they said I absorbed," she said. "One of the best pieces of advice I got is people are going to hate you,

just deal with it. "Peter also gave me advice about getting invited to events and having to know which ones to turn down, as you

really can't go to everything or you won't get time to write.

Here are Lynette's top ten creative writing tips from the workshops: 1. Read. A lot. You can't write well if you haven't read books and books full of good writing examples for comparison. 2. Healthy body, healthy mind. Do something active at least once a day. It'll clear

your head and enable you to have a fresh approach to your writing. 3. Get to know your

characters. You need to know them as well as — if not better than - yourself, so that when plot twists come, you can keep their reactions realistic Flaw vour favourites. It's easier for readers to connect with characters who have flaws because it makes them seem more real. They're just like us. And we love them all

the more for it. 5. Keep your dialogue realistically casual. It can help to read it out loud and see if it flows well when actually spoken.

6. Don't overdo your dialogue tags. "Said" is almost always enough.

Avoid detail overkill. Allow your readers to fill the gaps with their own imaginations. This will help them connect on a deeper level with your story and characters. 8. If you're bored writing it, people will be bored reading

it. This is a good rule of thumb to remember, especially during the editing process.

9. Trust your words. You're

the one telling the story, and that means you can do what you want with it. 10. Have fun! Remember to

write because you love writing.
